Each focuses on integration for youth within the communities, allowing them to continue working with their BCC treatment team (Social Worker, Therapist, Psychologist, etc.). Life skills instruction is a core focus as youth will transition to semi-independent or fully independent living arrangements. Each property provides the following:

WHO WE ARE

Board of Child Care is an private non profit providing youth with holistic therapeutic mental health treatment, staff secure, high intensity residential group homes, semi-independent living group homes, special education, and early learning programs across the Mid Atlantic region. Guided by our core values of Safety, Empathy and Integrity we see the Whole Child, not the behavior.

WHAT IS A RESIDENTIAL PROGRAM?

Our staff secure residential program is designed for adolescents who require short and long term care. Various care options are available based on the needs of the child, whether its semi-independent /community-based group home or a campus-style living arrangement. Our residential campuses and group homes are located throughout Maryland and in Martinsburg, West Virginia. Staffing ratios vary, but BCC is able to accommodate 1:1 care in certain programs.

WHAT DOES STAFF-SECURE MEAN?

Youth have movement within our properties, managed through staff supervision, not physical locks and barriers. Residential living and classroom spaces are built around staff supervision using Therapeutic Crisis Intervention (TCI). This allows all BCC staff to provide the least restrictive and most supportive environments for each child. BCC staff are retrained every three months in TCI to ensure the safest techniques are used.

Social & Life Skills

A wide variety of vocational training, college readiness, and college-level courses (credit earning) prepare youth for the transition to adulthood.



Safety

Each child lives in a physically and emotionally safe space. BCC teams are experts at environmental and behavioral management.

Care Team

At the core of BCC's program is the Care Team. Comprised of family, a Unit Supervisor, Case Manager, Social Worker and Psychiatrist. We mindfully meet each child where they are, not where they have been. Flexibility, Stability, Patience and Respect are key to Human Potential.

Family Engagement

BCC care teams set up the structure for parents and caregivers to remain engaged in the youth's therapeutic success. This could include scheduled phone time, visits to campus, or visits home. BCC believes skills learned in our programs must also work in the community after discharge. The care team works closely with each youth and their support network throughout their stay at BCC.

Emotional

Families are integrated into the success of each youth by licensed, masters-level social workers. Clinicians ensure that therapeutic techniques and interventions taught to youth and families work both at BCC and at home.



Evidence-based practices

Evidence-based programs provide an informed and scientifically-tested foundation for developing new programs and research studies in adolescent health. These resources offer insight into which practices are working and what practices need further examination in adolescent health.

Health

Each child learns and practices a healthy lifestyle. Medication management, nutrition, staying active, technology management and mental wellness oversight by Nurse Practitioners on staff and Registered Nurses.



Specialized treatment for males & females with:
